JOHN W. CAMPBELL PASSES TO BEYOND

Well Known Throughout Plateau Valley; Interment Made at Glade Park Cemetery

J. W. Campbell, for many years a resident of the Meadows, died last Saturday at his home in Glade Park, about twenty-nine miles southwest of Grand Junction, after a long illness. The direct cause of his death is given as Bright's disease. On Monday morning a funeral service was held at Glade Park church and the body was interred in the cemetery at that place.

John W. Campbell was born December 31, 1840, at Atica, Indiana. Died June 26, 1915, aged seventy-four years, five months and twenty-six days. He was married in 1862 to Sarah White at Farmer City, Illinois. To this union were born ten children, eight of whom are still living. The death of Mr. Campbell's wife occurred nineteen years ago, at the home of her daughter near Silverton.

In the spring of 1868 Mr. Campbell took his family and joined the exodus to Kansas, where he lived, near the town of Pleasanton, until 1890, when he

removed to Colorado.

It was in that year, twenty-five years ago last March, that the Campbells settled on their well known home place in the Meadows. Six years ago Mr. Campbell sold his Meadows property and removed with his daughter, Mrs. Carrington, to Grand Junction. For a while Mr. Campbell conducted a suburban grocery in that city. Later he acquired Glade Park property and removed to that place to end his days.

Though the Campbells are well known to nearly all of the upper Plateau's older settlers, only one of the boys, Charles, resides here at present. He was with his father when the end came.

J. W. Campbell was an honored citizen and a true friend to all who were privileged to know him. His home stood for the most open-hearted hospitality. He was affectionately known as "Grandpa Campbell" to a wide circle of acquaintances who learn with sorrow of his demise.
