Drowned in Grand River.

The Grand River claims another victim. This time Charles Vandevere, one of the pupils at the Indian School, is drowned while trying to ford the river after night.

On the 11th instant Mr. Chiles, the Industrial teacher at the Indian School, started to Leon creek, a branch of the Plateau in this county, with some of the attendance and all the pupils of the school for a summer vacation which the management generally gives the pupils. The first night out they camped with two wagons and teams in the deep gulch at the upper end of Orchard Mesa. They soon discovered that a mare belonging to one of the teams was wandering away. Mr. Chiles sent some of the boys after her, Charles Vandevere riding a horse, the mare's mate in the team. It seems that Vandevere rode down to the river bank and called across to Mr. Blain, who told him that the mare was on his (Blain's) side of the river. That night the horse returned to camp with bridle and saddle on—the bridle rein over the middle-horn—but the rider was seen no more until his dead body was found last Sunday lodged upon a small island a short distance below Mr. Blain's.

Mr. Chiles thinks that in some way the young man must have fallen or been thrown from the horse and stunned so that he could not recover before the current overcame him.

The body was seen in the river by some of the residents near by, and the fact was reported to Coroner Ingersoll last Sunday. Deputy Coroner Christy, after making an investigation, landed the body and it was brought to town early Monday morning. It could not be identified by the features, but the name of the dead man was distinctly written upon the shirt.

After determining the identity, Coroner Ingersoll concluded it unnecessary to hold an inquest.

School House and Court House.

The school board has just let a contract for the construction of the new school house. But a proposition is now under discussion to trade the present school house and block for the block where the county jail stands.

The present school block belongs to the school district. The north half of the block where the jail stands belongs to the city (for library, armory, etc.) and the south half to the county for a court house and county jail.

It is already noticeable that the public school building is rather too central. In fact it has been anticipated that a few more years will necessitate the sale of the present site for the high school building

as an evidence of fraud. But then no one holds him responsible for any of his acts.
