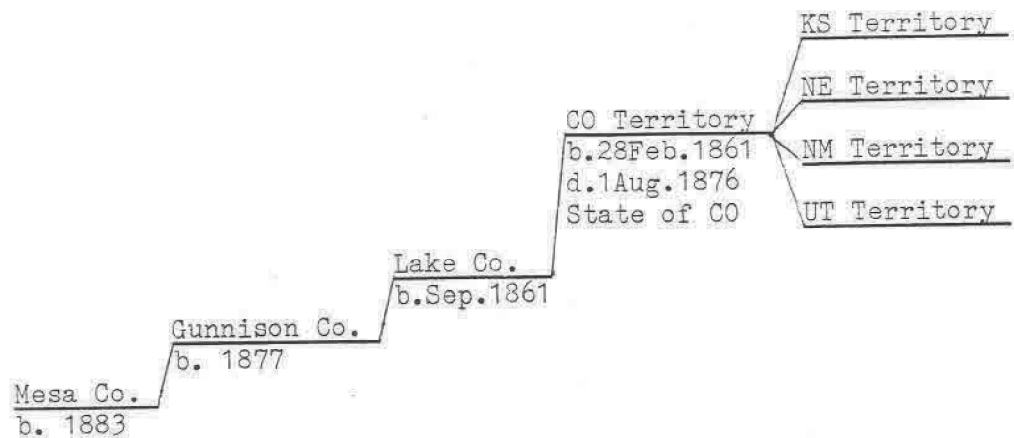

We need more volunteers at the public library and to work on our current projects.

Researching Military Records was the topic for our December meeting. We heard the first part of a very informative tape on Military Record Research. Due to the length of the tape, it was decided we would finish listening to it at another time. WHAT IS POTTER'S FIELD ?



Have you ever wondered why the poor are buried in Potter's field? What is Potter's field? Some say it's pauper's field.

The Funk and Wagnall's Standard Dictionary says: "Potter's field - a piece of ground appropriated as a burial ground for the destitute and the unknown."

The Encyclopedia Americana says: "Potter's field - the name commonly given a piece of ground usually adjoining a cemetery, and reserved as a burial place for strangers and the friendless poor."

The name is derived from its use in the following passage from the Bible: "And they took counsel, and bought with them (30 pieces of silver) the potter's field, to bury strangers in." Matthew 27:7. In reading the verses before and after the above, the 30 pieces of silver were the ones the Chief Priests had paid Judas for his betrayal of Jesus. He returned the silver and then hanged himself. The priests could not return the silver to the treasury because it was the price of blood--so they bought the potter's field. Matthew 27:8 says: "Wherefore that field was called...unto this day."

WHO IS BURIED IN POTTER'S FIELD ?



Pacheco, Middaugh, Russell, the names "don't ring a bell", they are gone, forgotten, those that lie in Potter's field. The story that is the saddest, is of the young girl dead of an over dose, and her mother pleading for help so the girl will not lie in Potter's field. There was no one, no family, no friend for this once well to do woman to turn to, in her hour of need. Her husband dead, her money gone, her daughter dead by her own hand after months of illness, the mother only wanted a final dignity for their name. It was not to be, in a little over a month the mother dead of grief and poverty, was laid to rest beside her daughter in Potter's field.

The veteran of the Civil War, no children, the comrades of his youth gone already, no one to care. He lies in Potter's field, no flags or flowers decorate his grave on Memorial Day, there is no tombstone, no marker to show that he did his best for God and country.

The unknown lie there also. The body taken from the river. The body found by the railroad tracks. The young man killed in a bar room fight, known by several names, one might be his real name, lost forever to his family. The man killed by the sheriff after he held up a store. No one remembers those lost souls. If you want to read the stories:

WHERE IS POTTER'S FIELD?



Potter's field is just below the Veteran's Cemetery on Orchard Mesa. It is on the riverside, in Grand Junction, Colorado. I am sure there are many Potter's fields in many towns across the United States, and there, too, are buried the poor, the destitute, and the unknown.

Viola's father was in the old Soldier's home in Sawtelle, California for several years, as the weather was warmer for his aching bones. Joshua became very ill, so she went to bring him home. They came back on the train in a compartment, so she could take care of him. He died in the Nelson Sanitarium, 5 January 1915, the next day after returning from the coast. He was buried beside his wife in the Whitewater Cemetery. Viola was gone from her family in the canyon for about a week.

In 1918 Viola was tired of living in the cramped quarters of the little one room house and wanted a larger one.

Matt said, "If you can build one for less than \$5,000 you can have it."

Viola designed her house and figured the cost down to the last nail and paid cash for everything. She could get the lumber all shipped in as a package deal from the state of Washington cheaper than buying locally. The house material was shipped on the train to Whitewater, and hauled to the ranch in a wagon by her son Jerome. Her house was finished in October in time for Matt's fiftieth birthday. All summer long she had cooked for the carpenters as well as the hayhands in the little house.

In 1923, Matt sold the outfit to Jerome, which included the Big Creek place that he had bought sometime before. Viola was very unhappy as she had only been in her new house five years. Matt and Jerome had not discussed the deal with her. It was quite a blow...and Viola Blew!! But as it was her son who bought the place, she finally cooled down.

They moved to Grand Junction to send Gertrude to school. Viola drove a car and was soon taking some of the teachers, Gertrude and school mates to various school activities on the western slope. Viola got around and had fun.

Matt did not like town life, so they were soon spending summers at Big Creek where Matt could ride, fix fence and irrigate the pastures. He also hunted for coyote, beaver, fox or other pelts in the fall. Coming to town when the snow got too deep. A few months in the cold winter time was all right in town.

Viola was in several car wrecks, but never a bad one. The worst was when she hit a street car at 12th street and Grand. She had a new car and hit the gas pedal instead of the brakes. The poor car came out second best in that one.

One time she was in some soft dirt on the new Land's End road on the top of Grand Mesa. It was not ready for use but she wanted to see it. She bounced over a culvert. We three kids in the back seat flew threw the air and bumped our heads on the wooden cross bar in the top of the car. We cried. It hurt. That little piece of cloth did not have much padding.

She said, " Well, you have to learn to ride in the car just like riding a horse. You go with the horse."

We Had--- gone with the car, bump, bump, thump!!!

Another time on the mountain, with Matt, in the front seat, and Gertrude and the crate of chickens in the back seat, she came to a screeching halt in a barrow ditch.

She jumped out of the car to look around and said, " Now see here!! Don't you say anything...don't you say one word!! You just keep quiet."

The poor chickens were squacking and making a great deal of noise as they were scared too.

Matt turned around and said, "Chickens be quiet.....Chickens shut up. Don't say anything!! Don't say one word!!

They were soon on their way to Big Creek again. They were moving up for the summer.

Grandma loved her family very much and was always doing for them. She had 11 grandchildren and got to see some of her great-grandchildren. She had a five generation picture with one of Esther's children, Leslie Wright, Lorena and Salinda Simpson.

In July 1951, the Devine's were elected to take Grandma Casto and Grandpa Matt to Santa Fe, New Mexico, to visit his only grandson, Steve Bowen, age 2½ and her youngest. Miles had a two week vacation and Viola had a new car. She never drove that one. She got someone else to drive her around in it. All the other family members were busy farming or working and had no time to go. We, Miles and Alice and two kids, all had a lovely trip.... most of it places we had never been too.

With old age Viola's eyesight was quite bad. One of the Granddaughter-in-laws, took Viola with her where ever she went to deliver the lunch for the men where they were working. They bounced over many of the roads of the area that Viola was familiar with in her younger days. Leola described where they were. She also threw an old rocking chair in the back of the truck, so Viola could be comfortable while eating her dinner out in the open with everyone else Viola enjoyed these outings and was always ready to go if she got the chance.

Viola finally lost her eyesight, and spent about five years in a nursing home. She had many friends who came to visit her in the home. Her mind was good and she enjoyed a good visit. She received many phonograph records from the services for the blind. She spent many hours listening to the stories or music. She didn't complain too much of her affliction.

At age 93 years, Viola passed away on the 4th of July of 1969. That was a fitting day for her to go, as she always loved to make the fourth of July a special occasion. She loved to cook up a special meal for the day and liked to serve either strawberry short cake or fresh cherry pie to whom ever was around.

She was quite a Grandma Casto, much loved by all.
